

Driving/Food delivery:

Suggested Protocol to keep you and your recipients safe.

Bring:

- Your car key fob (with whistle)
- Bring only an ID and credit card, both within easy reach
- Your phone
- Water bottle (In case of pepper spray)

Map the route. Keep in mind you should be in Airplane mode within a mile of a residence, so mapping may not be reliable close-in.

Set your phone not to unlock with Face ID.

DRIVING:

Using the Signal Chat,

Confirm the drive with your passenger. You can send them a selfie and photo of your car before pickup at a residence, or at least describe the vehicle.

FOOD DELIVERY: Most recipients in our food programs do not use Signal.

Confirm via a brief text after food pick up. For example:

Food from _____ (org donating)

11 AM

OK?

Also text them a selfie and photo of your car.

Ideally wait for a response.

When communicating, keep it brief and use Google Translate if necessary.

NEAR OR AT A RESIDENCE:

Driving: Use Signal for communication.

Food delivery: A mile or so away, switch to Airplane mode on your phone. Text only if necessary, briefly taking off airplane mode.

If ICE is spotted near your pick up/drop off spot, drive on! Go back later.

If you're stopped by ICE, quickly cancel your routing. Record the event if possible. Know your rights. (See next page)

Make certain your recipient gets back inside their home and door is shut tightly.

Food delivery: Confirm with your coordinator when you're done.

Car alarms have been used by residents when they spot ICE outside. So don't toot your horn when you arrive!

Lastly, you may be nervous about ICE, but it's nothing compared to the fear in the eyes of our recipients. They will have so much gratitude for your help. By the time ICE eases up, you may have made some new friends!

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS (From the ACLU):

1. **EVERYONE has the right to remain silent.** You can lawfully refuse to speak with an I.C.E agent and not answer any questions—especially about your birthplace, immigration status, or how you entered the U.S.
2. **EVERYONE has the right to speak to an attorney** and to not sign anything before doing so. Remember to not show any foreign or false documents.
3. **EVERYONE has the right to refuse a search** of their person and belongings without a judicial warrant.
4. **EVERYONE has the right to make a phone** call if taken into custody.
5. **EVERYONE has the right to record I.C.E. and police in public**, as long as they don't interfere with an arrest. Allies, such as U.S. citizens, can help by writing down names, badge numbers, and witness contacts.
